CRUCIAL ELECTIONS FOR CLIMATE IN 2022 - CLIMATE FAST JOINS OCEC

Dear climate advocates

We are in the most important three or four years for climate action. We need to act now so that we don't miss the window to keep temperature rise below 2 degrees. If you follow climate news you will know that government commitments to take action to stay below 1.5 degrees are <u>slipping</u> away since COP 26. In our very own province, we have a government that does not seem to care about climate targets and is increasing reliance on cars, building highways, permitting sprawl, and failing to protect our greenbelt, farmland, wetlands, and forests. Yet there is good news from science that if we stop fossil fuel emissions we will be able to stabilize the climate.

We have an opportunity to elect a climate-active government on June 2nd and we need to take it. To do so we need to make climate front and centre, and we need to link it to health, jobs, housing, the economy as well as nature protection. These are all of concern to Ontarians, as is the recovery from COVID. You can read more about current public opinion at this <u>ABACUS site</u>.

It's essential that we work closely with our environmental allies, and that we also 'expand our tent' to include major sectors in our society, i.e., Indigenous organizations, labour, faith groups, health professionals, and many more to create an effective voice for climate during this election. For that reason, ClimateFast is working with other groups, including Seth Klein and the Climate Emergency Unit, to create the Ontario Climate Emergency Campaign. We will come out with a 12-point plan for the next government and give it the broadest support possible. We will also work with Climate Voice and other organizations for public demonstrations throughout the spring.

Thank you all for your advocacy for climate. Our voices - and our votes - can make a big difference to our future.



Ring of Fire and protecting Indigenous and treaty rights



The Ring of Fire in northern Ontario is a massive planned chromite mining and smelting development project in the mineral-rich James Bay Lowlands. The Canadian Environmental Law Association (CELA), in solidarity with the Friends of the Attawapiskat River, is calling for the protection of inherent Indigenous rights and the waters of the Hudson and James Bay lowlands.

Like tropical and temperate rainforests, the peatlands sequester a huge amount of carbon and provide critical habitat for wildlife including caribou, wolverines, and many migratory birds.

Campaign to Put Climate in the Municipal Budget

The City of Toronto has adopted an ambitious climate target, Net Zero by 2040, and a plan to go with it. Concerned that the funds allocated in the proposed 2022 budget were insufficient to meet the climate action and climate justice goals, ClimateFast, in partnership with other organizations, campaigned for full funding for the Transform TO climate plan. Efforts included writing letters to the Mayor and Council, giving deputations at budget committee meetings and co-signing a letter as one of 59 organizations calling for the Mayor and City Councillors to address the crises in our city, and to improve the budget process. City Council met on Feb. 17th and passed the budget, with some amendments. Here's a link to their motions, amendments and how the councillors voted.

Request for an environmental assessment for the Bradford Bypass denied

The office of the Federal Environment Minister, Steven Guilbeault, confirmed on Feb. 10th that the second request for a federal environmental assessment of the proposed Bradford Bypass highway was denied. The Bradford bypass will negatively affect woodlands, the Holland Marsh, wetlands, and wildlife habitats. It will also enable an increase in single vehicle car use.

However, the project's future isn't guaranteed. Ontario is a few months away from an election and all the opposition parties at Queen's Park are either calling for the bypass to be cancelled or re-examined. The Simcoe County Greenbelt Coalition has not given up the fight. You can share information and strategies that support stopping the Bradford Bypass through the Bradford Bypass Organizing Group. An End to Oil and Gas in Quebec

Bill 21, introduced in the National Assembly of Quebec on February 3rd, will put an end to the exploration and exploitation of hydrocarbons, namely oil and gas, in the territory of Quebec. See the press release from Centre Québécois du droit de l'environnement. Also, CBC News reported that, as of December 31, 2021, Quebec has banned oil heating in new homes and will make it illegal to replace existing oil furnaces with any sort of heating system powered by fossil fuels after Dec. 31, 2023.

Burnaby City Council endorses the FFNPT

On January 24th, Burnaby City Council voted to endorse the <u>Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty</u>, becoming the sixth municipality in Canada to do so! The others are the <u>City of Toronto</u>, <u>City of Vancouver</u>, City of New Westminster, District of North Vancouver, and District of West Vancouver. A total of 34 cities & sub-national governments have endorsed the treaty, along with 152,737 Individuals and over 1,000 organizations.

Gas stoves leak methane even while off, boosting climate change (CBC Jan 28, 2022)

According to a study published Thursday, Jan. 27, 2022, in the journal <u>Environmental Science & Technology</u>, gas stoves are worse for the climate than previously thought because of constant tiny methane leaks even while they're off. Many communities have bans on gas stove use in future new construction that will take effect in future years. <u>Read more of the CBC article</u>.

Ontario to initiate a registry for clean energy credits

Ontario has announced a new voluntary registry for businesses that want credit for using non-emitting electricity, both renewable and nuclear. The Ford government says the clean energy credit (CEC) registry will give companies another option to meet their sustainability targets, and is headlining the system as a way to attract new investors to the province. However, the Pembina Institute cautions that an open-ended market for clean energy credits won't be enough to drive the renewable energy development the province needs. 




Etobicoke Climate Action has released Achieving Net Zero Buildings by 2050, a summary of recommendations for reducing GHG emissions associated with Canadian buildings. They recommend the creation of a Climate Emergency Response Organization (CERO), endorsed by all levels of government, with participation from academia and industry.



The <u>Canadian Institute for Climate Choices</u> has released a new report that assesses whether existing and proposed government measures support or hinder the private investment needed to drive Canada's long-term success through the global low-carbon transition. Success, in this context, means both strong economic growth and a smooth transition for workers and communities.

The Ontario Clean Air Alliance has published a report critiquing the October 2021 response of the Independent Electricity System Operators (IESO) to 32 Ontario municipalities that are calling on the Government of Ontario to phase-out our gas-fired power plants. According to the IESO, it would be impossible to phase-out Ontario's gas plants by 2030.
