We Made History!!

Toronto City Council Endorses Call for Fossil Fuel Treaty



On July 15th Toronto City Council voted in an overwhelming majority to pass the [motion](#) made by Councillor Mike Layton to endorse the call for a [Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty](#).

Climatefast, Mobilize TO and Fridays for Future Toronto led the [Toronto campaign](#), with hundreds of individuals and organizations writing to the City Council to urge them to support the treaty. We give a big thank you to Councillors Mike Layton and Shelley Carroll for moving and seconding the motion, and to all of you who supported the campaign. You made it happen!

Federal election call expected soon



Ban the sale of ivory in Canada

Ivory-Free Canada Coalition has put forth a [petition and letter template on Change.org](#) to ban the sale of elephant ivory in Canada. On July 23rd the federal government launched a [public consultation](#) to hear feedback on proposed measures to restrict or end elephant ivory trade.

Stop construction of the Trans Mountain Pipeline

As of July 15, 2021 97 per cent of the detailed route of the TMX has been approved, but construction of the project can only proceed when applicable conditions have been met. Two corporate-indigenous partnerships have submitted proposals to purchase the TMX, but several First Nations remain deeply opposed to it due to environmental risks. This [new TMX petition](#) calls upon the House of Commons to immediately stop the construction of the TMX pipeline and instead invest in a made-in-Canada Green New Deal. The petition was opened on July 7, 2021 and will close on November 4, 2021.

Stop financing oil expansion in Amazon

Stand.com has started a [petition to for banks to adopt an exclusion policy for the Amazon region](#). The petition is a result of a study that found JP Morgan Chase, HSBC, Deutsche Bank, Goldman Sachs, and Citigroup are at “very high-risk” of funding the destruction of the Amazon.

Protect BC's old growth forests

Stand.com is hosting a [petition to save BC's old growth forests](#), which is one of the most effective things we can do to mitigate the impacts of climate change. The B.C. government committed during the last election to implement the recommendations of the old growth review panel but they still haven't followed through. [Watch the video](#)

July 21: Quebec has rejected GNL Québec's application to build a C\$14-billion liquefied natural gas (LNG) terminal in the Saguenay region, capping years of opposition by Indigenous communities, climate campaigners, scientists, economists and health professionals. Équiterre recognized over 120,000 Quebecers who signed petitions, as well as 54 student associations, 250 doctors and health professionals, and 60 civil society organizations that protested against the project.

July 19: In an open letter to leaders in the US and Canada, over 500 organizations have called on [policy makers to reject carbon capture and storage](#) as it is not a solution to the climate crisis.

July 19: Advocates call for Ontario to [improve tracking of heat-related deaths](#) as impacts of climate crisis threaten vulnerable populations.

July 16: [Angus Reid poll](#) shows climate change and the environment top Canadian concerns, in every region of the country except Alberta and Saskatchewan.

July 15: The Minister of Environment and Climate Change Canada announced that they would be investing over 1.65 billion dollars over the next 3 years into the [CLIMAtlantic program](#). Based in New Brunswick, CLIMAtlantic aims to provide Canadians with the tools and data needed to adapt to climate change.

July 14: The [European Commission](#) published a dozen legislative proposals to ensure its climate and energy laws fit the ambition that, by 2030, there will be a 55% cut in emissions, compared with 1990 levels

July 9: The [Lower Duffins Creek](#) wetland complex in Ontario is no longer at risk of being destroyed by developers. The Ontario government revoked the controversial Minister's Zoning Order (MZO) that threatened the area, following an injunction motion brought by Ecojustice to stop work at the site. This reversal was due largely to environmental groups, community organizations, Indigenous groups, and concerned people donating, signing petitions and making phone calls to protect the wetlands.

July 2: [Bill C12 for climate accountability](#) was passed! Tens of thousands of petition signatures, hundreds of letters to politicians and editors, op-ed pieces and news articles, social media 'storming' were key to making this happen. Bill C-12 improves transparency and consistency

around climate action and will allow Canadians to hold the federal government accountable for meeting emissions reduction targets.

July 1: France's top court ordered the French government to take "all necessary additional steps" to reach its climate targets. The court gave the government nine months to comply or face sanctions.

The [Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty Initiative](#) published [Fossil Fuel Exit Strategy](#), a new analysis from the [Institute for Sustainable Futures](#). It concludes that there's already an excess of fossil fuels needed to make the transition away from fossil fuels, and renewable energy potential is enough to keep warming below 1.5°C while expanding clean energy access to all.


A “renovation wave” to decarbonize Canada’s buildings could not only make homes more livable, but inject \$48 billion into the Canadian economy over the next 20 years. That’s according to ["Canada's Renovation Wave: A plan for jobs and climate"](#), a new report by the Pembina Institute, a non-profit clean energy think tank. Their study found that upgrades could create 200,000 jobs while making a sufficient dent in carbon emissions.
