

You need to sign up by Friday Jan 21st to speak on Jan 24th or 25th on what we need to see in Toronto's 2022 budget to ensure action on the Net Zero by 2040 plan moves forward with the funding it needs. Submissions can also be submitted in writing by the 25th. Write to buc@toronto.ca to secure your speaking spot, or to submit your thoughts to the committee. ClimateFast held a training on Jan 19th with speakers Councillor Mike Layton and Kathryn Tait, climate campaigner from Toronto Environmental Alliance, and Lyn Adamson on deputation tips. This is an election year - so it's an especially important time to make sure councillors know we care about climate, that big actions are needed to reach the 2030 target, and that we want to know they support the needed funding and staffing, and a climate lens applied in all departments.

Stop the "Big Sprawl"

Land use decisions are crucial for a liveable climate. Urban sprawl has been called <u>'Ontario's tar sands'</u> for its impact on emissions. <u>Compact cities</u> and inter-city transit are ways to reduce emissions rather than increase them. You may send a message to your MPP using this Environmental Defence <u>letter against the Big Sprawl</u>.

Highway 413 and the Bradford Bypass

The Ontario government is planning two mega-highways in the GTA, the 413 and the Bradford Bypass, despite opposition from regional and local municipal councils, environmental organizations, and many citizens. These highways will pave over farms, forests, wetlands and a portion of the Greenbelt and cost taxpayers billions. It will also add over 17 million tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions by 2050.

Write a letter demanding that the provincial government stop Highway 413 and the Bradford Bypass. You can use the <u>letter template</u> provided by Environmental Defence.

Petition against the Bradford bypass

Go to <u>e-3766 Environment</u> to call upon the Minister of Environment and Climate Change to designate the Bradford Bypass project for a full federal impact assessment. The petition is open until Feb.6, 2022:

Protect the National Experimental Farm

Sign this <u>petition halt the destruction of the 41 acres of the Central Experimental Farm</u> and 12 acres of the NCC parkland at Queen Juliana Park. Help us get to 7,500 signatures!

Support Conversion to Heat Pumps

<u>Send a message to Ontario Energy Minister Todd Smith</u> to establish a no down payment, zero-interest loan program to help electrically heated homes convert to air source heat pumps for home energy savings up to \$2,000 per household

Human Rights Watch World Report 2022



Human Rights Watch's <u>World Report 2022: Canada</u> is critical of Canada's performance in 2021. While acknowledging that the federal government has made efforts on advancing rights issues, it has fallen short on addressing Indigenous inequality, tackling climate change, overseeing Canadian mining operations overseas and assisting Canadians trapped in Syria. Also, Canada is a top G7 greenhouse gas emitter, and the world's top financier of fossil fuel producers. "Canada is contributing to the climate crisis taking a growing toll on human rights around the globe".

216 Million Climate Refugees Projected by 2050

According to the article "Environmental disasters are fuelling migration — here's why international law must recognize climate refugees", by Daniel L. Huizenga, University of Toronto, the World Bank estimates that without radical and concerted efforts to slow climate change, 216 million people will be displaced within their own countries by 2050. According to the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, climate change impacts the human rights to life, self-determination, development, health, food, water and sanitation, adequate housing and cultural rights. International refugee and human rights law must be urgently overhauled to recognize deadly environments as sites of persecution. The United Nations Refugee Agency has already established links between climate change and persecution, but it is only a first step towards recognizing that people displaced by climate change are, in fact, refugees For more information read Protecting Climate Refugees by the Environmental Justice Foundation or view Climate Refugees - The Film.



Climate Science - in just 6 charts

In order to better understand the policies and impacts of global warming, it's useful to understand the science behind it. Betsy Weatherhead, an atmospheric scientist, has provided 6 slides for a better understanding of the science of climate change.



The International Energy Agency (IEA) has released <u>Canada</u> 2022 <u>Energy Policy Review</u>, a detailed compendium of the country's energy resources and climate policies. It gives a positive assessment of Canada's plans and commitments. However, the oil and gas sector remains a major source of greenhouse gases and there needs to be improvements in energy technology innovation for the deep decarbonisation that is needed in oil and gas production, as well as in the transport and industry sectors. Strong action is also needed to curb methane emissions. Read the <u>press release</u>.



Around the world, disasters are becoming more frequent and severe — a trend that is only expected to intensify as the climate changes in the coming decades. <u>Building a Resilient Canada</u>, a report recently published by the Council of Canadian Academies, examines current practices and emerging actions to reduce vulnerability and exposure to natural hazards through the integration of climate change adaptation and disaster risk reduction.

An Analysis of the Potential for Air Source Heat Pumps to Reduce Energy Costs and Greenhouse Gas Pollution

This report by the Ontario Clean Air Alliance finds there is a strong financial and environmental case for the installation of air-source heat pumps in homes that currently rely on electric heating (e.g., baseboards or electric furnace).
